The Strength of an Organization like the United Way of Marion County is its autonomy and focus on the LOCAL community. In 2021-2022 this positioned United Way to meet community needs in specific and unique

Starting in 2020 and continuing through this last year, United Way created an unprecedented partnership with Marion County Commission to meet the needs of residents. The administration of over \$19 million from the US Treasury assisted nearly 3,000 Marion County families with rent and utility payments to keep households stable while recovering from the pandemic.

Without assistance, Marion County would have seen a spike in families being displaced from their housing and numerous other areas negatively impacted in our community. Additionally, students' educational programs would have been disrupted as they changed schools - they may have not attended school entirely. Our business community would have been impacted as employees struggled to find housing, impacting their attendance and job performance.

United Way's efforts didn't just impact the families receiving assistance. We've all benefited from the way these efforts maintained stability in our community.

Your United Way also stepped in to help the families displaced by the Tornado that ripped through Ocala in March. Specifically, United Way provided nearly \$50,000 in assistance to 19 families, getting them rehoused and stabilized.

Stability for a thriving community. THAT is what United Way does. THAT is what YOU do through United Way. Together we make Marion County a place where all can thrive, and a place we are all proud to call home.


